

Korean Language and Writing System (AI)

Korean is the official language of North and South Korea, spoken by over 81 million people globally. It is written in a highly efficient phonetic alphabet called Hangul and relies on **politeness levels** to indicate respect based on social hierarchy.

The Hangul Alphabet

Developed in 1443 by King Sejong the Great, Hangul was specifically designed to boost literacy. It is made up of 24 letters:

- **14 Consonants:** ㄱ(g) ㄴ(n) ㄷ(d) ㄹ(l,r) ㅁ(m) ㅂ(b) ㅅ(s) ㅇ(o) ㅈ(j) ㅊ(ch) ㅋ(k) ㅌ(t) ㅍ(p) ㅎ(h)
- **10 Vowels:** ㅏ(a) ㅑ(ya) ㅓ(eo) ㅕ(yeo) ㅗ(o) ㅛ(yo) ㅜ(u) ㅠ(yu) ㅡ(eu) ㅣ(i)

Letters are cleverly grouped into syllable blocks, making them visually distinct rather than written in a simple linear line.
