Finding your way around Chicago:

Streets are numbered and named east and west from State St and north and south from Madison. Each 100 is a block. Our hotel is at 633 N St Clair – between Ohio and Grand. That means we are 6 blocks north of Madison.

Transportation

CTA Buses and Trains -- \$2 + \$0.25 transfer Closest station to the hotel is the red line at Grand. Transfer to other lines, or walk to Blue Line at Washington, Green/Orange/ Purple/Brown at State and Lake. Transfers are free between train lines. Things to do:

Grant Park Music Festival at the Pritzker Pavillion (Sat 7:30pm and Wed 8:00pm). You can take a picnic, a bottle of wine and sit on the grass for free!!

There will be fire works at Navy pier just about when the concert ends on Sat, so you can take the serpentine bridge over to the lake to look at the fireworks.

<u>Millenium Park</u> -- just wander around – walk through the bean, paddle in the fountains – walk over to the Lake, walk to the Burnham Fountain.

Navy Pier and Lakefront - You can rent bikes at Navy Pier and ride along the Lake Shore path. Unless you are up early (before 10am), go south -- it is much less crowded. It is easy riding with great views over the lake. The Ferris Wheel also gives you a great view of the lake shore (remember that George Ferris did the original Ferris Wheel for the 1892 Chicago World's Fair).

Go up the <u>Hancock tower</u> to the Signature lounge. For the price of a beer or glass of wine you get to sit, get a free elevator ride. It is a better view than the observation deck which costs \$\$. (I like the Hancock Tower better than Sears Tower as you look up and down the foreshore of Lake Michigan

<u>Museum of Contemporary Art</u> -- it is small and ALWAYS has something weird and interesting. Within walking distance of the conference

<u>Museum of Science and Industry</u> – Great Museum -- Hyde Park.

(Nice bike ride from Navy Pier if you are energetic) (To get there:

- Take the #2 Hyde Park Express south to 57th and Stony Island and walk 1 block east to the Museum.
- Take the #6 Jackson Park Express bus south to 56th Street and walk 1 block south to the Museum.
- Take the #28 Stony Island Express south to 56th and Hyde Park Boulevard and walk 1 block south to the Museum.
- Take the #10 Museum of Science and Industry bus from Michigan Ave.)
